## Guest Speaker - Børre Skodvin Jensen & Skodvin Architects, Oslo, Norway

Børre Skodvin graduated from the Oslo School of Architecture and Design, (AHO) in 1988. He has been a tenured professor of Architecture at AHO since 2013, where he was also the leader from 2009 – 2012. Skodvin was the Vice President of the Norwegian Architects association from 2005 to 2008. In 2013, he was awarded Int FRIBA (RIBA's International Fellowship).

In 1995, Skodvin co-founded Jensen & Skodvin Architects with Jan Olav Jensen. Jensen & Skodvin Architects realize ideas in the form of built work while contributing to the development of the tectonic culture of architectural profession and with a deep concern for utilising wood.



## Key note address - Merritt Bucholz & Karen McEvoy Bucholz McEvoy Architects, Dublin, Ireland

Merritt Bucholz is the Head of the School of Design at the University of Limerick. He was formerly a visiting professor at Harvard University, Princeton University, Cornell University, University College Dublin and Dublin Institute of Technology.

Karen McEvoy has lectured in the School of Architecture at the University of Limerick, Dublin Institute of Technology, University College Dublin and Harvard University.

They co-funded Bucholz McEvoy Architects in1996 and are known for their outstanding contribution to timber technology, sustainability and architectural design. Their new administrative office building currently

under construction for Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, is one such project that will set a benchmark for timber technology and sustainable design in commercial building.
